Collecting children at Home time – thank you for your patience with home time – we are getting quicker every day in KS2. If you have a child in Thatchers or Potters we are trying to get their siblings in KS2 ready so that the younger children have less waiting time, so hopefully they will be first ready. Thatchers have their space under the canopy on their carpet. Miss Sides (or myself on a Monday) will send the children from the carpet once they have all their belongings and a parent is there. Children are really getting used to this routine. Our priority, as always is the safety of our children, ensuring all the children leave school with their adult.

Late Club Themes

This term, staff continue to organise a Late Club each with a theme – comics, art, authors/books, construction and board games are starting in the Autumn term. Wrap around care can be booked (or cancelled) up to 2pm on the day. On a Monday, there will be a football club for Y2 and Y3 again led by Mr Farrell and Mr Bradley. Mrs Newbery and Mrs Dixey has very kindly offered to run a netball club for Y3, 4 and 5 on a Thursday. Both these clubs will have a limit on numbers and a slip will need to be

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returned to school next week. If over-subscribed we will pull out of a hat! There will also be a small charge for both, payable when a space has been confirmed.

Please remember to **name everything**, so it can be returned to the child. Lost property box is empty and will only have unnamed uniform added. Children need a book bag every day so that they can carry their reading book, reading record and letters/slips. Please do not put water bottles in as they have a tendency to leak. Please read every night with your child and sign the record book, ask a few questions about the book and discuss if they enjoy the book and why – it has a huge impact for your child. Children are expected to wear uniform, with correct shoes and hair tied back. PE kits worn on PE days.
