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Explore the Past:

- Draw a Roman soldier and label all of his equipment and note how it protected him. Compare this to Celtic warriors.
- Create a PowerPoint presentation or leaflet on the Roman Invasion of Britain. What facts could you include that others may not know?
- Research Roman inventions – which ones are still used today?
- Who was Boudicca? Tell her story.



Be Creative:

- Create your own mosaic.
- Research Roman bust sculptures. Sketch one, using different tones, or create your own using air-drying clay.
- Design your own gladiator. What weapons and skills would you need? Imagine you are a Celtic warrior, write a diary entry about 'The Day the Romans came'.



Values – Respect and Rules and Values

- * Create a questionnaire to find out what it means to be British and ask the people who live in your community. Think about the British Values; democracy, rule of law, respect, liberty and tolerance.
- * Imagine you were the Prime Minister of the United Kingdom, write a letter or create a poster to promote your British Values. Can you create your own slogan?
- * Think of three ways you can help someone in your community and have a go at it. This could be helping someone with their shopping or their gardening.

STEM Challenge

- Investigate aqueducts. Can you build a model that really carries water?
- Design and make a pair of Roman sandals that fit your feet.
- Romans enjoyed listening to and making music. Research Roman instruments, then design and make an instrument of your own.
